The Engineering Institution of Zambia (EIZ) has embarked on an ambitious journey to redefine its identity, enhance visibility and re-position itself as a key player in national development.

D uring a Stakeholder Engagement Breakfast meeting held at Radisson Blu Hotel on 9th April 2025, EIZ unveiled its plans to revamp its image through a comprehensive rebranding strategy - a critical component of its 7-point Plan.

The Institution will undertake this project threefold:
Rebranding the corporate image, rebranding the physical identity and rebranding the institutional culture.

10% of annual road sector work plan budget recommended for research and developmentt

The Engineering Institution of Zambia (EIZ) has called on Government to allocate 10 percent of the annual road sector budget to Research and Development.

his recommendation was made last month during EIZ's submission to the Committee on Transport, Works, and Supply, following the release of the Auditor General's special audit report on the Road Development Agency (RDA) for the financial years ending 31st December 2017 to 2022.

EIZ President, Eng. Wesley
Kaluba, emphasised that
dedicating a portion of the
road budget to Research
and Development is crucial
for improving the quality,
efficiency, and sustainability of
Zambia's road infrastructure. He
stated that research plays a key
role in guiding project planning,
ensuring value for money, and
embracing innovative practices
in engineering and construction.

"This investment in research will help identify the best technologies and materials suited to our local conditions, enhance project management practices, and prevent the repetition of costly mistakes," he said.

The special audit report highlighted several inefficiencies in the road sector, including poor project planning, unbudgeted for expenditures, and delays in payments to contractors, issues that have led to avoidable penalties and interest charges.

In response, EIZ proposed practical solutions such as proper budgeting, timely release of funds, and the engagement of qualified consultants to ensure quality assurance.

Further supporting the recommendations, EIZ Vice President for Policy, Public Relations, and National Development, Eng. Kennedy Musonda, stressed the importance of using systematic processes such as those outlined in FIDIC (International Federation of Consulting Engineers) standards, which are grounded in quality and time management.

Additionally, Engineering Technical Committee Chairperson, Eng. William Mulusa, underscored the need for engineering professionals to be certified in project management to improve delivery and oversight.

President Kaluba also pointed out that many failures in the road sector do not just come from technical issues, but from governance systems. He noted that if project governance, from initial pronouncement through implementation is strengthened, engineering professionals would be better

equipped to deliver successful outcomes.

"The implementers of projects also need protection through strong governance structures," he said, adding that, "Stakeholders should avoid making pronouncements before conducting proper feasibility studies."

He further commended the Government's shift towards innovative financing mechanisms, such as Public-Private Partnerships (PPPs), citing the Lusaka-Ndola dual carriageway project as a positive example. However, he cautioned that while PPPs are a promising approach, they also present potential risks and should be handled transparently. "Before agreements are signed, they should be made public to allow for scrutiny," he added.

EIZ continues making steady progress towards IEA membership

The Engineering Institution of Zambia (EIZ) is making steady progress in its bid for full membership in the International Engineering Alliance (IEA), a global body that promotes best practices in engineering education and professional standards.

n collaboration with the Engineering Council of South Africa under a mentorship Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), EIZ is aligning Zambia's engineering qualifications with international benchmarks to enhance the quality and global mobility of Zambian engineers.

A key milestone in this process was a workshop held from 13th to 16th May 2025 at Sandy's Creations event park, in Lusaka.

The activity focused on integrating the Washington Accord Graduate Attributes into selected degree programmes at the University of Zambia,

Copperbelt University, and Mulungushi University, covering Chemical, Electrical and Electronics, Mining, and Mechanical Engineering.

EIZ Vice President Eng. Kennedy Musonda commended the universities and the Higher Education Authority for their support.

Chairperson of the EIZ IEA Committee, Eng. Dr. Michael Kalumbu Nsefu, applauded the full participation and collaboration, noting that it was vital to advancing the application to the IEA.

The event included a guided tour of the University's civil engineering laboratories and facilities, offering stakeholders a firsthand look at Northrise University's commitment to engineering excellence.



Professionals empowered with practical training on bidding and project management

The Engineering Institution of Zambia (EIZ) held a one-day training workshop aimed at building the capacity of engineering professionals in bidding for public contracts, accessing the Constituency Development Fund (CDF), and managing projects effectively, at Radisson Blu Hotel in Lusaka.

S peaking at the event held on 16th May 2025, EIZ Registrar and CEO Eng. David Kamungu said the workshop reflected the Institution's commitment to equipping members and stakeholders with the knowledge and skills required to thrive in a dynamic and competitive environment.

This initiative will ensure that Zambian engineering professionals remain globally competitive by keeping up with the latest methodologies in project planning, execution, and risk management.

Under this MoU, PMI will provide structured training programmes and certification support to help EIZ members gain essential project management credentials. As part of this effort, EIZ will work towards becoming an Authorised Training Partner (ATP) for PMI-CP™, enabling it to offer accredited project

management training aligned with international best practices.

By facilitating access to world class project management training, this initiative will equip engineers with skills to manage large-scale infrastructure projects effectively, improve efficiency, sustainability, and risk management in project execution, and enhance career growth opportunities for Zambian professionals.

Beyond professional training, this partnership also extends to policy research and industry advocacy. PMI will collaborate with EIZ to engage government and industry stakeholders in adopting strong project management principles across regulations, training programmes, and infrastructure policies. This effort aligns with Zambia's long-term development goals, ensuring that the engineering and construction sectors operate with globally benchmarked efficiency and accountability.

This partnership represents a shared vision between EIZ and PMI to build a more resilient, capable, and globally competitive engineering sector in Zambia. By equipping professionals with world class project management skills, EIZ is strengthening the country's ability to deliver complex infrastructure projects across key industries, including construction, energy, and transportation.


